Upper Noe is one of San Francisco's oldest neighborhoods, encompassing the southern part of the valley from Cesar Chavez Street to beyond 30th Street to the end of Church at Randall Street.

Upper Noe overlaps and includes much of the Fairmount Tract, which runs south of 30th Street and is today considered to be part of Glen Park, at least administratively. Thus, the neighborhood of Upper Noe straddles the present boundaries of Noe Valley and Glen Park. Many folk south of 30th Street consider themselves residents of Upper Noe. Our membership includes residents well beyond these boundaries and we are happy to call all of them neighbors.

Let's Talk Topography

Much of the success of our neighborhood is attributable to its walkability. Church, Dolores and Sanchez Streets create excellent north south paths through the valley floor, perfect for pedestrians and rich with transportation options. Our park, shops, restaurants, and institutions create opportunity to mingle and share with our neighbors, to build community. However, much of our neighborhood is also a steep hillside that rises over 280 feet from Church St to Diamond St., providing stunning views, challenging terrain and sparse transportation options to share in all that our community offers. We seek ideas and solutions that consider the entire community and the often competing requirements of our residents to build a better Upper Noe for everyone.
